Presentation

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The second day in February is the Feast of the Presentation of the Child Jesus in the Temple which is also called the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin. Forty days after his birth, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the Temple of Jerusalem to present him to the Lord as the Law of Moses prescribed. They carried with them the usual offering of the poor, a pair of turtledoves.

At the time of the Presentation and Purification there was in the Temple a just and God-fearing man named Simeon who recognised the infant Messiah, and taking him in his arms, declared him the Saviour, the Light of the Gentiles and the Glory of Israel.

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Gratitude is extended to all our parishioners who last weekend contributed \$3,120.65 to the Bushfire Appeal. Holiness is often thought of in terms of piety. However, charity is a just as important, especially when personal funds are offered to those most seriously in need. As recorded in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus said: "what you do to the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you do to me". The cheque has already been mailed to Saint Vincent de Paul who have announced that all proceeds of the collection are going directly to victims of the fires and that no fees are being withheld.
