First Sunday of Lent ~ Year C ~ 8/9 March 2025

This Sunday the first of Lent is also known as Quadragesima Sunday. Quadragesima is from the Latin word for fortieth from this Sunday it is exactly 40 days until Good Friday.

Some suggestions of how we can observe our obligations during Lent are: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of Penance and all who are aged 14 years and older must abstain from eating meat on these days.

Prayer ~ additional Mass attendance, family prayer, reading the bible, making the Stations of the Cross, praying the Rosary.

Self-denial ~ not eating sweets or desserts, giving up entertainment to spend time with family, limiting food and drink to give to the poor.

Helping others \sim special attention to the poor, the ill, the elderly, the lonely, the bereaved, the depressed, the overburdened.

Penance Programme 2024/25

Families with children in the Sacrament of Penance programme need to hand in their completed workshop books. Tubs will be in place on either side of the altar and books need to be placed into these. Books should be fully completed before being handed in, no pages or activities can be missed, or the books will be returned for further working.

Next Tuesday 11 March at 5.00pm the first of our Prayer Assessment evenings will be held in the church. Wednesday 12 March at 6.00pm will be the second Assessment evening. Children with even birthdays are asked to attend on Tuesday and those with odd birthdays on Wednesday. These times need not necessarily be strictly adhered to, if your family has a commitment and you need to come on the opposite evening or if you have two children in the programme one with an even birthday, the other with an odd date you are welcome to come to the evening that best suits your family. Children should know the three prayers, The Our Father, The Hail Mary and The Act of Contrition very well. There will sufficient numbers of attendants to hear the prayers and this will help the evenings to run smoothly. Quietness will need to be observed while families are in the church, please ensure that every child has the ambiance you would like for your child.

Year of Jubilee

Gotta Question: Would you like a Jubilee Indulgence?

In our everyday vocabulary, the idea of an indulgence is normally associated with earthly pleasures that stimulate the senses. A big part of spiritual growth is to keep these carnal desires under control. And that's not always so easy. Far too easy to fall into sin, sometimes seriously.

So across the centuries, the church teaches that plenary indulgences are available – which is a way for Catholics to reduce the amount of punishment and penance that needs to be undertaken for sins. Here's a simple breakdown:

- **Indulgence**: It's a reduction of the temporal punishment due to sin, the guilt of which has already been forgiven. So an indulgence is a bit like a big discount from the debt that needs to be paid for sin.
- **Plenary**: This means "full" or "complete". A plenary indulgence removes all of the temporal punishment due to sin. Seems almost too good to be true.

To receive a plenary indulgence, certain conditions need to be met, such as performing a specific act (like reading the Bible for half an hour), going to confession, receiving the Eucharist, praying for the Pope's intentions, and being free from all attachment to sin, including venial sin. Indulgences can also be partial, which means they only reduce part of the punishment due to sin.

So what's so different about a Jubilee Indulgence?

The overarching theme of a Jubilee indulgence is to encourage spiritual renewal, reconciliation, and acts of kindness, emphasising God's boundless mercy and forgiveness.

So here's what it takes from the faithful:

- ✓ To be truly repentant.
- ✓ Free from the affection for any particular sin.
- ✓ Moved by a spirit of charity.
- ✓ Purified through the Sacrament of Penance.
- ✓ Refreshed by Holy Communion.
- ✓ Praying for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff.

Pope Francis explained that the Jubilee Indulgence is also a way of discovering the unlimited nature of God's mercy.

BUT: a Jubilee Indulgence also requires devoutly visiting any Jubilee site and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic Adoration and meditation, concluding with the Our Father, the profession of faith, and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God. Pilgrims are also encouraged to recite the Holy Year Pilgrim's Prayer.

So this is where the parish will help.

All parishioners from both our parishes will be advised of a bus trip to one of the pilgrim sites. Details have yet to be determined.

However, the visit to a particular site will be for a few hours and include the above-mentioned devotions and opportunity to receive the sacraments.
