If ever having been to the Holy Land, it is impossible not to develop a deep appreciation of the beautiful sacred places available to pilgrims and tourists. The preservation of these places is one of the great imperatives of humankind. The funds required come from the Good Friday collection that is conducted universally every year. But this year, there were no sacred ceremonies across the world because of the Corona Virus. So belatedly, the universal church is trying to salvage at least a little income to provide for the Catholic Church's custodians – the Franciscans – and to have funds necessary for operation of these sacred churches, shrines and holy places.

Spiritual Insight

From Pope Frances:

Jesus enters Jerusalem in order to die on a cross. And it is precisely here that his kingship shines forth in godly fashion. His royal throne is the wood of the cross.

It reminds me – says Pope Francis – of what Benedict XVI said to the cardinals. You are princes, but of a King crucified. That is the throne of Jesus. Jesus takes it upon himself.

Why the cross? Because Jesus takes upon himself the evil, the filth, the sin of the world, including the sin of all of us, and he cleanses it, he cleanses it with his blood, with the mercy and the love of God.

Let us look around. How many wounds are inflicted upon humanity by evil! Wars, violence, economic conflicts that hit the weakest, greed for money that you can't take with you and have to leave.

Love of power, corruption, divisions, crimes against human life and against creation. And – as each one of us knows and is aware – our personal sins: our failures in love and respect towards God, towards our neighbour and towards the whole of creation.

Jesus on the cross feels the whole weight of the evil, and with the force of God's love, he conquers it, he defeats it with his resurrection.

Church Law (can. 914) states the following:

It is primarily the duty of parents and of those who take their place, as it is the duty of the parish priest, to ensure that children who have reached the use of reason are properly prepared and, having made their sacramental confession, are nourished by this divine food as soon as possible. It is also the duty of the parish priest to see that children who have not reached the use of reason, or whom he has judged to be insufficiently disposed, do not come to holy communion.
